

I am blessed with a wonderful Building and Grounds Committee, we met the first weekend of February and walked the entire property, identifying maintenance items and minor and some semi major repairs that we will attempt to get done in 2020. We will be meeting again this week to prioritize the projects and I will include a list in the next newsletter.

In addition, as many of you already know, we also dealt with a gas leak in the Parish Hall last week. The leak was discovered by the Ladies in the Jazzercise group and the City came out and turned off the gas and



locked the meter. Long story short, we had two leaks, one behind the furnace in the Parish Hall and the other in the gas line to the kitchen. The line to the kitchen was capped, the leak behind the furnace was fixed, and the heat was turned back on. We are waiting on an estimate to run new gas line as soon as possible, but until that happens we have heat but no stove.

The work has begun on the Sunday School Room, that the Vestry approved at the end of last year. The East and West walls have been sheet rocked, new ceramic tile has been installed and we will be painting soon.

Since prayer is the primary activity and responsibility of the Order of the Daughters of the King, it is appropriate every few months to review what we are learning about prayer, and to share the Parish Prayer List for those who might be willing to pray for those in our parish family who have requested prayer. We will not, however, share here the prayer concerns the

Daughters have been asked to hold in confidence.

For most people, prayer is an activity. And in many instances, it is right to consider it so. We pray for God's presence when we gather to study, to perform service, to worship, to enjoy a meal together. It is a comfort to know that God is present with us and is enjoying our company, and guiding our being together through His love and grace. This is a very familiar kind of prayer.

Another kind of prayer is intercessory prayer. I used to think that praying meant telling God of my needs and those of others, and my prayer life consisted of giving God a daily "to-do list." I'd sit down with my prayer list and pray for each person, reminding God what their needs were, and instructing Him on the best way to handle it. "Guide the surgeon's hands, O Lord...; provide the best medicine...." I woke up one day and realized that God already knows exactly what each person needs; I do not need to instruct God! Now, I just mention the names and hold each person lovingly in my heart for a moment, knowing that God is with them and providing the very best for them at that moment. Well, then, why bother praying at all? Because we human beings thrive on love, and for lots of people to be holding a needy person in their hearts before God believing that God's healing process is going well, bathes that person in God's love and can speed the healing. At least, that is my sense of what intercessory prayer means. But here we enter into a great mystery; nobody but God knows what healing prayer is all about. All we know is that Jesus asked us to do this for one another.

aint of the Month

Willibrord and Boniface November 7 and June 5 Respectively

We're often told to go out and evangelize. We rarely do, and doing it isn't the easiest thing in the world. However, a good deal of north European Christianity owes its origin to English missionaries.

These two are an excellent example. They're usually mentioned together, though the connection between them is rather slight. Anyway they worked at the same time, in the late seventh and early eight centuries.

Frist, Willibrord. He was from Northumberland (that is, Yorkshire) on the northeast coast of England, then the most Christian part of the country. His Dad was a recent convert and signed his son on at a monastery—a deed we would find shocking but it was normal then, and it raised no eyebrows. Willibrord eventually became a Benedictine, and spent many years in a monastery. These including a good deal of time in Ireland, in those days the center of education in Europe.


Over on the north coast of Europe was the kingdom—or kingdoms, we aren't sure which—of Frisia, that is, the Netherlands, Belgium, The Luxembourg and a bit of north Germany. Frisia has quite a history, and even today some Frisian languages are spoken here and there. A king—or anyway, someone who was in charge—asked for missionaries,

and Willibrord volunteered and went. He landed in about 690 and spent the rest of his life there, finally dyiing in an abbey he had founded in a place in Luxembourg, called Echternach.

His methods were rough, though I suppose typical of the time; he simply destroyed pagan temples and images, cut down sacred trees and the like. However, this did convert the Frisians—or some of them. In fact a good many of them held out.

His connection with Boniface is that Boniface lived on his premises and preached for a year. Then war broke out and they both had to leave. When Boniface came back he went to see the Pope, and the Pope sent him to Germany, where he worked the rest of his life. He ended as Archbishop of Mainz—Mainz is a city on the Rhine in about the middle of its course through Germany, so called because the Main joins the Rhine there. But that was years in the future. Boniface went to Germany as a bishop with no diocese, no people, and no idea what to expect.

One thing he did have going for him was the backing of Charles Martel—"Charles the Hammer"—and his sons. (You may remember Charles Martel; he was the one who defeated the Arabs in 732, and kept them from overrunning France and western Europe.) Charles probably helped arrange one of Boniface's first acts in Germany, which was to cut down an



enormous tree sacred to the sky god. When Boniface (or, I would guess, his workmen) got it about half way down a great wind came up and blew it over, and the people saw that no harm came to him and were converted. At least that's the story and it's probably partially true; at least Charles and Boniface couldn't have arranged the wind.

Boniface is a more spectacular figure than Willibrord. There are various Lives of him, and we have his correspondence and some of his other writings. He was from Devon—that's the opposite end of England from Yorkshire—and, among other things, he was a teacher. The Latin grammar he wrote for his students survives, as does a treatise on Latin poetry. In 715 the abbot of his monastery died and Boniface was expected to succeed him, but he chose to turn it down and go off on mission.

He founded or helped found six diocese; a good many people credit him with the political foundation of Europe east of the Rhine. In later life—at the age of 79, to be exact—being worried about the paganism of the Frisians (Willibrord had left a lot of work) he left Mainz and traveled to Frisia on mission. He had protection but a group of Frisian highwaymen attacked his party and put



them to death, so he is a sort of martyr. The story is told that he forbade his escort to fight with them. After killing Boniface's group the hishwaymen opened their baggage, and instead of finding treasure found a lot of manuscripts. They burned them in disgust, but one that survived is a valued relic.

This matter of being missionaries. There is a way to do it. We can't all be Willibrords or Bonifaces—not everyone is a red hot salesman—but we can be alert to the opportunity, when it presents itself. I'm no extravert but I have managed to do that, and I recommend it to you.

Those of you who attend the 10:30 service probably have not met Tim Arend. Mr. Arend attends the 8:00 service, and has done so for many years. Tim was raised in Carlsbad, New Mexico He moved to Las Cruces to attend New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts (as NMSU was called until 1960). He graduated with a degree in Agricultural Business.

Tim started attending St. James' in 1965, just before the I-10 Freeway was built. In fact, he lived in a little adobe house right where the freeway runs east of St. James' property; it had to

be knocked down to make room. He began attending St. James because of an invitation from a group of men who were working with the irrigation system of the (much larger) lawn to the east of the church building, near his home. Boyce Williams (husband of Nora Williams), Alec Lytton (Joanne's hubby), David Francis (belonging to Virginia), and Prof. Hamill included him in their conversation (and work, I would think!), and Tim decided to attend here the next day. St. James' is Tim's first and only church home. He has been an active member ever since, serving as Senior Warden during the time the freeway was being built over church property. Imagine the inconvenience! The complaining! Our Parish Hall revamp was small potatoes by comparison, I'm sure. Tim is very proud of the fact that all three of his sons attended St. James and served as Acolytes until they were in High School.



He was in the cotton business for five years, and travelled a lot—too much, in fact. He and Mary Lou had started a family, and Tim wanted to be home more. In 1968 he became Crop Loan officer at the Farmers and Merchants Bank (now 1st Western).

Now, back to the Model A's. Tim worked at odd jobs while he was in college, his favorite one being pumping gas and fixing cars at the Skelly gas station on Valley Drive (now a bus stop). He had always loved Model A's, and purchased his first one over 30 years ago, relying on the skills he'd honed as a mechanic at that gas station many years prior to get it into running order. His first two Model A's were two-doors with "rumble seats." This third

Model A is his favorite; he drives it to church most Sundays. Three of his four grandchildren drove it during their Christmas visit this year. Driving a standard transmission was a new (and jumpy-jerky) experience for them! I had Tim pose the car in front of the Church for a nostalgic note of history!
