

Thank you for a smooth annual meeting on the 31st. A big thanks, especially, to Sig Johannsen, Lucy Kirkland, and Godfrey Crane for their work in pulling it off.

Please join me, too, in thanking our outgoing vestry members and officers for all they've done especially though this most difficult year. Outgoing vestry members Daniel Armistead, Terry Meyer, and Manny Terrazas all did marvelous work on behalf of the parish throughout their term.

I especially want to thank our executive council who supported me for the past year, keeping me on the straight and narrow and helping to focus on issues for the parish and the vestry. Manny Terrazas suffered through long hours with me as my Senior

He joins Lynn Marshall who will continue as Jr. Warden for a second year; also the third year of her term. Lucy Kirkland has agreed to take on the role of Clerk of the vesty. And Mary Ganier has agreed to serve as treasurer. They join our freshman class of vestry members, Phil Benson, Jennifer Huntsberger, and Dottie Storey. Welcome aboard!

With COVID continuing to ebb, we're at the point where we can again offer some programming on campus. We've decided to offer "Eucharist to go" starting this Sunday from 10:30-11:30. The Eucharist will be delivered in single-serving, mechanically sealed packages. I'll be kitted out in mask and gloves to provide contactless delivery as you drive up to the church and through our parking lot.

We'll do the same thing for Ash Wednesday, 17 February. While we'll record the service from broadcast via our usual channels, we'll offer "Ashes to Go" outside the church from 7:30-8:30 and 4:00-5:00 to coincide with rush hour, and 11:00-12:00 noon for lunch hour. Same plan as above: drove through the church parking lot, I'll be there with gloves, a mask, & face shield to impose ashes either on one's forehead or hand.

I think this is probably enough newsfor now. Thank you all for your continued vigilance with regard to COVID infectivity, and your patience with us all as we figure out changes on the fly. Hopefully soon we will be able to meet again in person.

St. James' Vestry Minutes January 19, 2020

CALL TO ORDER meeting called to order by Fr. John at 6:05 Pm with prayer with special intentions said for our leaders to be inaugurated tomorrow.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES- December 22, 2020 regular meeting and January 5, 2021 special meeting. Nyeta asked that the Finance Reports be removed from the regular consent agenda and will be addressed during the regular meeting.

CONSENT AGENDA- COMMITTEE REPORTS (as sent out via email) Fr. John asked for motion to approve the agenda and minutes. Glenn moved, Lynn seconded and the agenda and minutes were approved.

RECTOR REPORT-FR. JOHN TOBER

- COVID infectivity still hovers around 13%, which precludes in-person worship. Reminder: infectivity needs to drop below 10% in the county for approval from the diocese for inperson worship on campus. Good news is there was not a significant spike post-holiday season, so people must be maintaining their levels of self-protection.
- Diocesan clergy have discussed recently and received permission for imposition of ashes for Ash Wednesday (in an "Ashes to Go" format) and for drive-thru Eucharist. I'm working with all necessary parties to institute/re-institute this ASAP... hopefully by Ash Wednesday at the latest (pending approval by the vestry). February 17, 2021 is Ash Wednesday.
- I've contacted the deanery about cross-posting service offerings for the churches in our deanery to give people viewing options during this time. Dc. Laurie (our dean) thinks it's a good idea and supports it. We also talked about sharing best practices for recording/livestreaming services. I've asked Rick Marshall to come up with a plan (i.e. script, etc.) to showcase what we do, if we're asked.
- We received a bid for a new neon sign to replace our aged sign by the road. The bid (an elevation was distributed last month) was ~\$45k... which seems excessive to me. While I think we need to come up with other signage, I think there may be other options. I've asked Manny Terrazas to help me research other options.
- The Jr. Warden, Sr. Warden, and I discussed my evaluation. Strengths and opportunities for growth were both noted. I've taken some steps already, but will discuss the results with the new Jr. & Sr. Wardens about the results and what opportunities for change they would like to support. One step was attending a week-long preaching conference last week. It was a good reminder of some techniques that I haven't employed regularly; so, I feel it was a worthwhile experience.
- Coffee hour and Social hour zoom meetings are occurring. Attendees have been few. I continue to advertise during recorded services and announcements have gone out in newsletters.
- I think we're in a good way for presenting the parish's annual meeting on 31 Jan. Key players are scheduled to meet on Monday, 25 Jan, to look things over and double check

our processes. I look forward to our new additions to the vestry for the next 3 years. I'm also incredibly grateful for the work of our outgoing vestry members, Terry Meyer, Daniel Armistead, and Manny Terrazas, as well as our clerk for (at least) the past 2 years, Jennifer Terrazas. I can't thank you all enough for helping St. James' get to where we are now and setting the foundation for years to come.

TREASURER-NYETA HAINES

- Change in the budget from what was sent to Vestry previously and Nyeta went over the changes. Our pledge amount did decrease and we had to move a couple of pledges over into restricted fund which impacts our operational budget. We now are at \$34,000 for the 2021 budget year.
- The PPP second round added a requirement that we had to have a 25% decrease in revenue in any quarter during 2020 annual year. Nyeta presented the 2019 revenues versus the 2020 revenues. Therefore, we do not qualify for the second round of the PPP loan. We heard from our bank and we will definitely quality for loan forgiveness on the PPP loan. Nyeta feels certain that we will not have any problems receiving forgiveness.
- We ended the year in the black. This is not due to increased pledges, but rather to decreased costs in all areas, as well as the PPP loan we received.
- The Vestry designated fund went up due to contributions to the fund. The City of Las Cruces CARES grant also went into this line item, though it will be moved into operations soon.
- The Finance Committee talked at length about the Citizen's Bank account and that it will be at almost \$80000 once the CARES monies are moved from Vestry designated to Operational. The Finance Committee will be making the recommendation to move a portion of this money into the Charles Schwab account so that we may earn interested on this money.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS-LYNN MARSHALL (SEE JR. WARDEN REPORT ABOVE)

STAINED GLASS WINDOW REPORT TO VESTRY, JAN.19, 2021 by Terry Meyer-The window should be shipped on Friday, Jan. 8, 2021 and will arrive within three to five business days. Therefore, it is expected to arrive at St. James Wed., Jan. 13th and Friday, Jan. 15th. Terry will work with the church office to ensure someone will be there to receive the product. He is also communicating with La Ventana Glass to facilitate installation as soon as possible after the window is received at the church.

* The window was recently installed.

TRIM WORK is ongoing and he has been working several hours a day towards completion. Fr. John sees him several times a week for 3-4 hours a day. A lot of work has been accomplished.

EVANGELISM, MISSION AND OUTREACH-TERRY MEYER-COMMITTEE REPORT JANUARY 19, 2021

The committee recommends the following topics be given high priority and continued for the 2021 calendar year:

Farmers Market project Esperanza Bags Advertising on KRWG-FM-PBS-Radio A "Campus Ministry" presence at New Mexico State University Effort to recruit an Iona Seminary student for Internship at St. James for Fall 2021 semester

The monthly meeting date has been changed to the first Wednesday of the month, 8:45 am. Dottie Storey and John Fitzgerald have paid for the supplies, including a \$5 bill for another 40 Esperanza Bags. Thank you very much, Dottie and John. Approximately 30 bags have been distributed to the homeless and the remaining 10 are located in the church office. All members of the congregation are invited to drop by the church during regular office hours and help with the distribution of the remaining 10 bags to the homeless. Terry Meyer will be

completing his three- year term on the Vestry at the end of January, 2021, and another Chairperson for the committee. (Vestry members will be signing up for new committees at the first meeting held after the retreat, including EOM).

Minutes from DECEMBER 8, 2020, 8:45 AM, ZOOM MEETING

The minutes of the October 14th., 2020, meeting was approved without revisions.

- Strategic Planning for 2021 was discussed in terms of what topics were considered to be "High Priority" and therefore should be continued in the future, and what topics were "Low Priority" and need not be continued unless personnel are available and the budget permits.
- The items considered "High Priority" included: Farmers Market Project, Esperanza Bags, continuing with advertising on PBS, KRWG-FM radio, Continued Effort to Recruit Second Year Iona Seminary Student for Internship at St. James for Fall Semester, 2021, Campus Ministry Effort,
- The items considered "Low Priority" which will not be maintained on the list of agenda items in the future include: Support of Mesilla Park Elementary School, Children's Reading Alliance, Support for the Honduras Project, Grant Application to the Rio Grande Diocese, and Collaboration with another Episcopal Church for Special Project for 2021.
- It was also suggested that the EOM committee monthly meetings should be changed to 8:45 am, the first Wednesday of the month rather than the second Wednesday of the month. This is in response to monthly meeting report requirement by the Vestry Clerk. Therefore, the future meetings will be the first Wednesday of each month. This will start in January 2021.
- Dottie Storey and John Fitzgerald have volunteered to donate all supplies for forty (40) Esperanza Bags. Contents will include: Granola bar, Kleenex, sanitary wipes, bottle of water and \$5 bill. Terry Meyer will work with them regarding the distribution of the bags to the homeless. Thank you very much, Dottie and John, for your generosity.
- **Terry Meyer** announced he will be ending his three-year term on the Vestry at the end of January, 2021, and a new Chairperson will be needed to replace him should the Vestry and Fr. John desire to continue with the Evangelism Outreach and Missions Committee. (this is a standing committee and will continue)

Laint of the Month **Goddess, Holy Woman or Both? Brigid of Kildare, February 1**

We think of St. Patrick as characteristic of Ireland. The Irish do too, but they put St. Brigid right in there with him. There are various ways of spelling her name; we would be likely to write "Bridget." However, "Brigid" seems to be the preferred spelling.

Was there a Brigid or not? Brigid was the Irish goddess of love, spring, childbirth and lots of good things. She was, in fact, the Irish version of the earth mother whom the world worshipped-see Ishtar, Diana of the Ephesians, the Aztec Tohnantzin, etc.--and much of the world still does. She was much beloved. When Ireland became Christian, is it likely that people simply missed Brigid, and made her saint to stay in contact with her? Quite likely.

On the other hand, is it equally likely that many newly Christianized parents had a daughter baptized as Brigid, and one of them grew up to be a famous nun, the one who introduced the Religious Life (i.e. life under "regula" rule) for women into Ireland. Some



scholars say one thing, some the other. I don't see why both shouldn't be true.

Brigid lived in the fifth century, perhaps thirty years after St. Patrick; it's said, in fact, that Patrick baptized her mother, which isn't unlikely. Anyway the family was aristocratic, so Brigid got a good education, for her time. She is credited with founding a good many convents—too many, to my mind, but St. Teresa in the sixteenth century founded quite a few. Anyway, the most likely one is at Kildare, of which more later; Kildare is a small town in the east, about tirty miles west of Dublin, and today is a bedroom community for Dublin.

But more interesting than the historical Brigid are the yarns which are told about her, which I'm sure derive from the story of the goddess. One the Irish people like particularly is the one about her cloak. Brigid asks the pagan king of Leinster for a piece of land to found a convent.

"No way, why should I give you any land?"

"Well, can I have a cloak's worth?"

"Sure, haw haw, you can have that much."

So Brigid laid her cloak on the ground, a young nun took each corner of it, and they all ran off in opposite directions, the cloak enlarging and enlarging behind the. "Hey, what are you doing?"

"I'm going to cover your kingdom. That's what you get for being stingy." Brigid got her land, and the king shortly became a Christian. I don't blame him; I would have.

Another Brigid story which I enjoy has her sharing her bed (as people of that day often did) with a young nun. The girl was devout but full of energy, and when she thought Brigid was asleep she quietly sneaked out of bed to meet her lover.

But she had conscience, and to stop herself she put hot coals in her shoes. This stopped her all right, but ruined her feet. Anyway she limped back to bed.

In the morning Brigid, who had seen the whole thing, said, "My daughter, you have quenched the fire of passion and avoided the fire of Hell. Let me take care of your feet"; and she laid hands on her and healed them.

"Kildare" means "church of the oak"; there had been a shrine of the goddess Brigid there under a big oak tree, and Brigid, if it was she, founded her convent in the same spot. She had a wooden church built there. It was replaced a few years after her death by a nicer one, and soon it became a cathedral, as it still is. The cathedral was destroyed heaven knows how many times over the centuries, but always rebuilt, usually larger and more handsome. The present church was finished in 1896, and is a big and beautiful building.

Good luck to the Irish people; they have a tough history, and have climbed their way out of poverty into a comfortable life. We hope Brexit, England's exit from the European union, doesn't do them too much harm; it threatens to pat a hard border between northern and southern Ireland, which would cause a great deal of difficulty.
